FOREWORD

The Karamoja Development Partners Group (KDPG) is made up of bilateral and multilateral donors and UN agencies working in the Karamoja sub-region. Key objectives of the KDPG include enhancing dialogue between development partners and the Government of Uganda (GoU) at both national and regional level, and strengthening coordination and harmonization between development partners, including alignment with GoU priorities as set out in the Karamoja Integrated Development Plan (KIDP) 2015–2020.

This mapping exercise has been completed by the USAID-supported Karamoja Resilience Support Unit (KRSU) on behalf of the KDPG. This is the third year this mapping exercise has been completed. Over this period, donor investment has increased from an estimated \$60 million in 2016 to over \$75 million planned expenditure for 2018, with investment coming from the UK, the European Union (EU), Germany, Ireland, Italy, Korea, Sweden, the US, and the World Bank.

There is a substantial investment, and indeed progress is being made. Recent data from the Uganda National Household Survey show that 85% of people in Karamoja report that their living conditions have improved in the last three years, which they attribute predominantly to a more peaceful environment and to improved access to safe drinking water.

However, the National Household Survey also demonstrates the extent to which Karamoja remains marginalized. Across the country, 5% of children of school-going age have never attended school, while in Karamoja this figure is closer to 50%. Karamoja has the highest dependency ratio in the country and the highest rates of income poverty at 61% compared to 27% at the national level. Seventy percent of households in Karamoja report that they have no access to a toilet, while the average national coverage for rural areas is 9%.

Clearly there is still a lot of work to be done. All of the members of the KDPG are committed to working with GoU at both local and central levels, with civil society organizations who play such a central role in delivering results, as well as with the private sector. Updating this mapping exercise on an annual basis is a key part of our commitment to being open, transparent, and accountable to GoU and other key stakeholders.

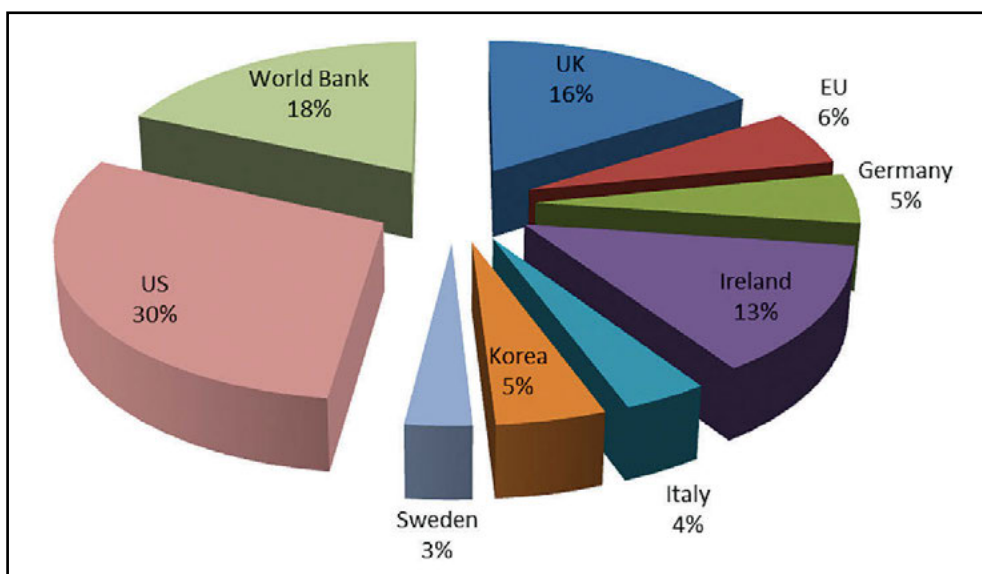

SUMMARY

This report summarizes planned humanitarian and development activities of nine bilateral donors in the Karamoja sub-region in 2018.

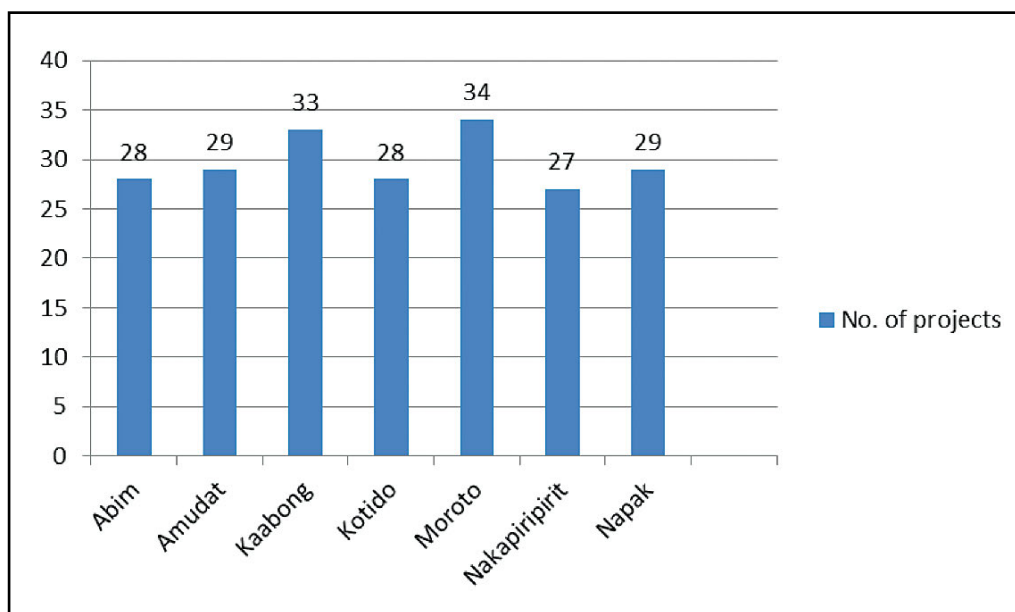
The donors have allocated over US\$75 million, which is approximately 270 billion Ugandan shillings. US funding represents 30% of the total estimated donor spending, followed by World Bank, UK, and Ireland with estimated spending of 18%, 16%, and 13% respectively. See Figure 1 below and Table 1 for details.

Figure 1. Karamoja donors' estimated spending for 2018.



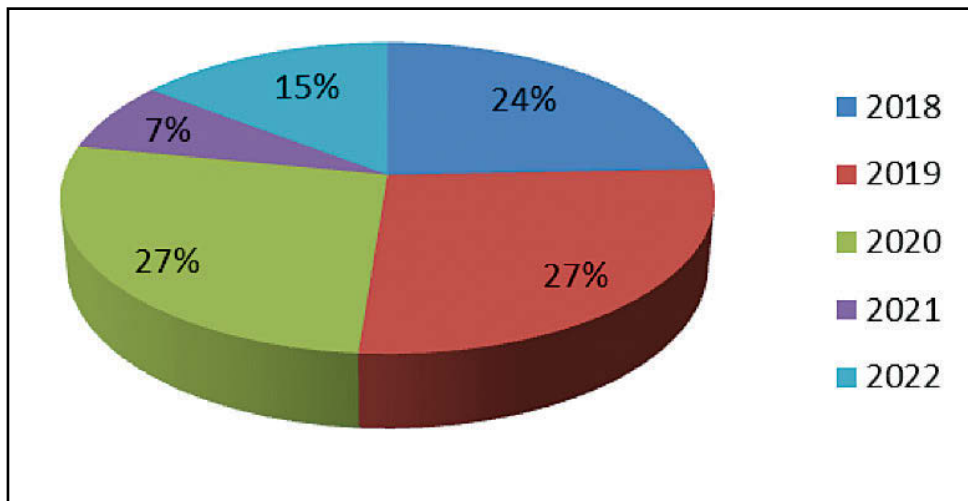
A total of 41 projects are funded by the nine donors. The distribution of the projects across the seven districts is almost uniform. Moroto and Kaabong Districts have a slightly higher number of projects, with 34 and 33 projects respectively. See Figure 2 below and Table 2 for details.

Figure 2. Number of active projects by district in Karamoja, 2018.



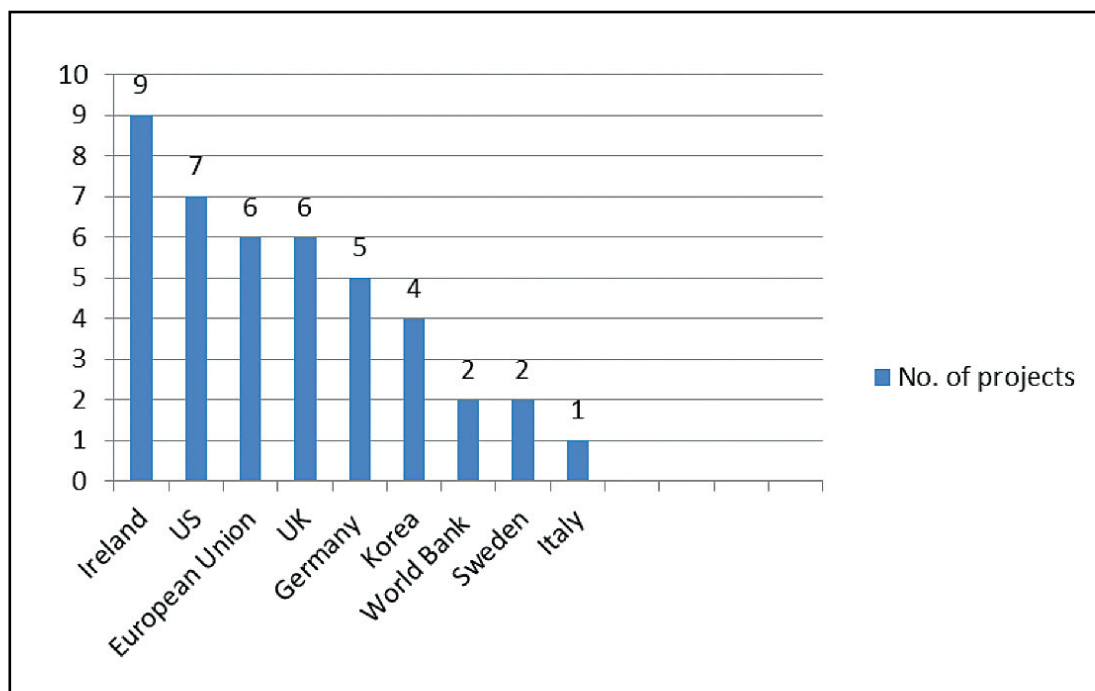
The majority of the currently active projects in Karamoja are long term. Most of the projects started implementation towards the end of 2017 and will continue through to 2021/2. A good number of ongoing projects will also continue through 2018 and 2019. About a quarter of projects will come to an end in 2018. See Figure 3 below and Table 3 for details.

Figure 3. Projects by end date in Karamoja, 2018.



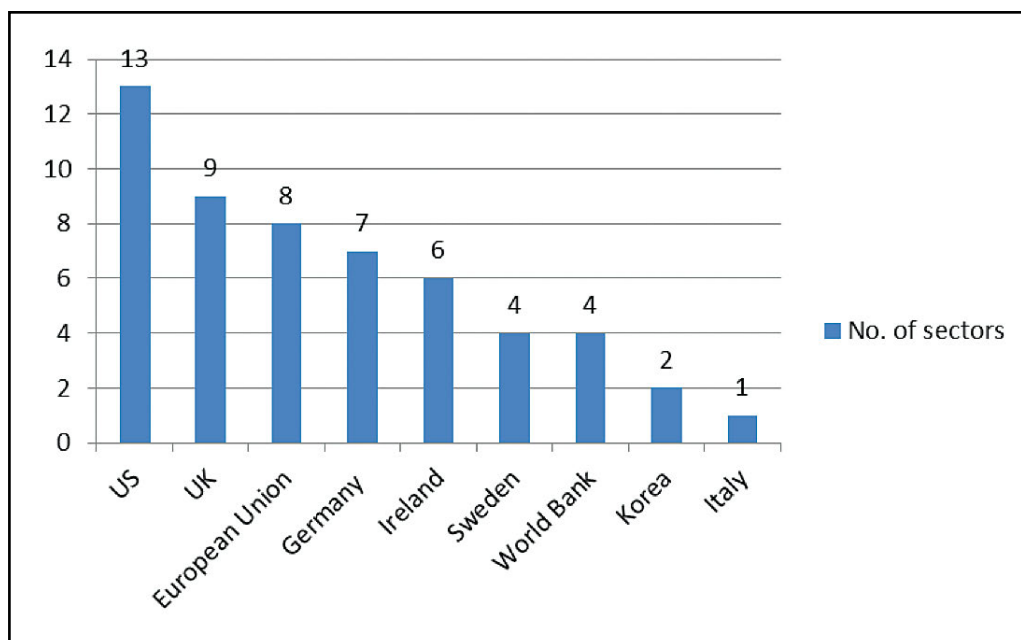
Most of the donors support multiple projects. Ireland funds the highest number of projects, 9 projects out of a total of 41 projects, followed by the US with 7 projects. The UK and EU fund 6 projects each. See Figure 4 below and Table 1.1–1.9 for details.

Figure 4. Number of projects by donors in Karamoja, 2018.



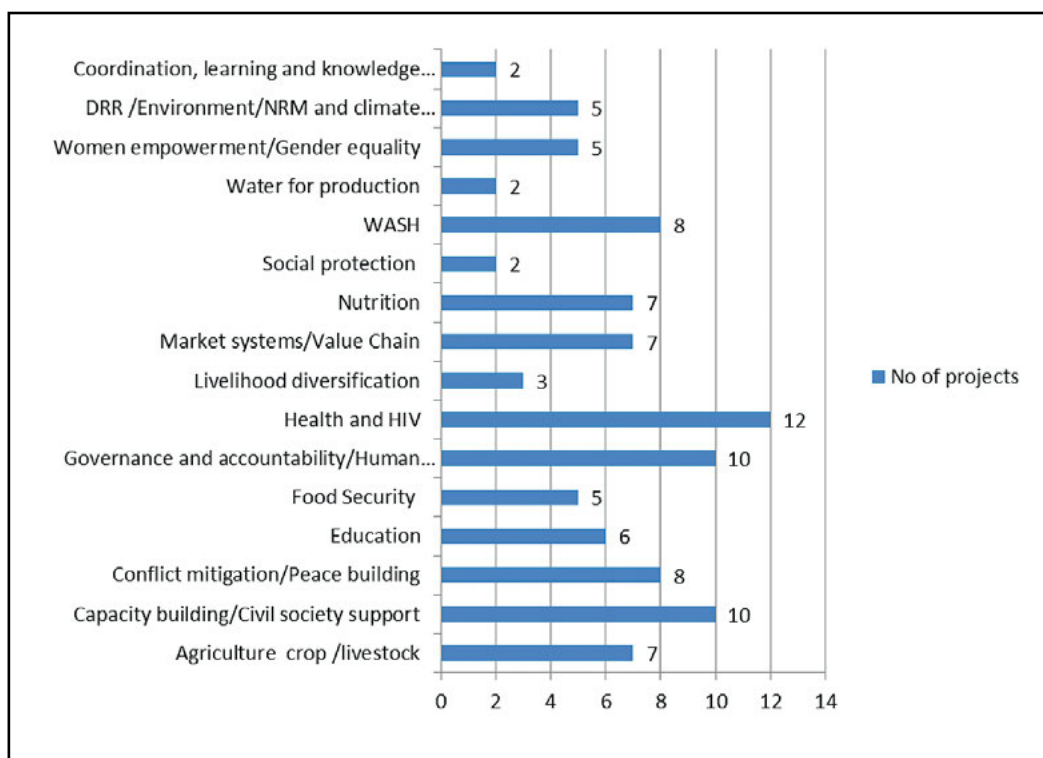
Most of the donors support multiple sectors. US projects support up to 13 different sectors followed by UK, EU, Germany, and Ireland supporting 9, 8, 7, and 6 sectors respectively. See Figure 5 below and Table 4 for details.

Out of the total 41 active projects in 2018, 12 projects will implement health and HIV/AIDS activities, followed by governance/accountability and civil society capacity-building activities to be implemented by 10 projects. A number of projects are also engaged in agriculture, WASH (water, sanitation, and hygiene), climate resilience, and market systems strengthening. A few projects support water for production. See Figure 6 below and Table 4 for details.

Six out of nine donors support health and HIV/AIDS activities. Similarly, governance and accountability activities are supported by six donors, followed by market systems strengthening, which is supported by five donors. See Figure 7 below and Table 4.

Figure 7. Number of donors by sectors in Karamoja, 2018.

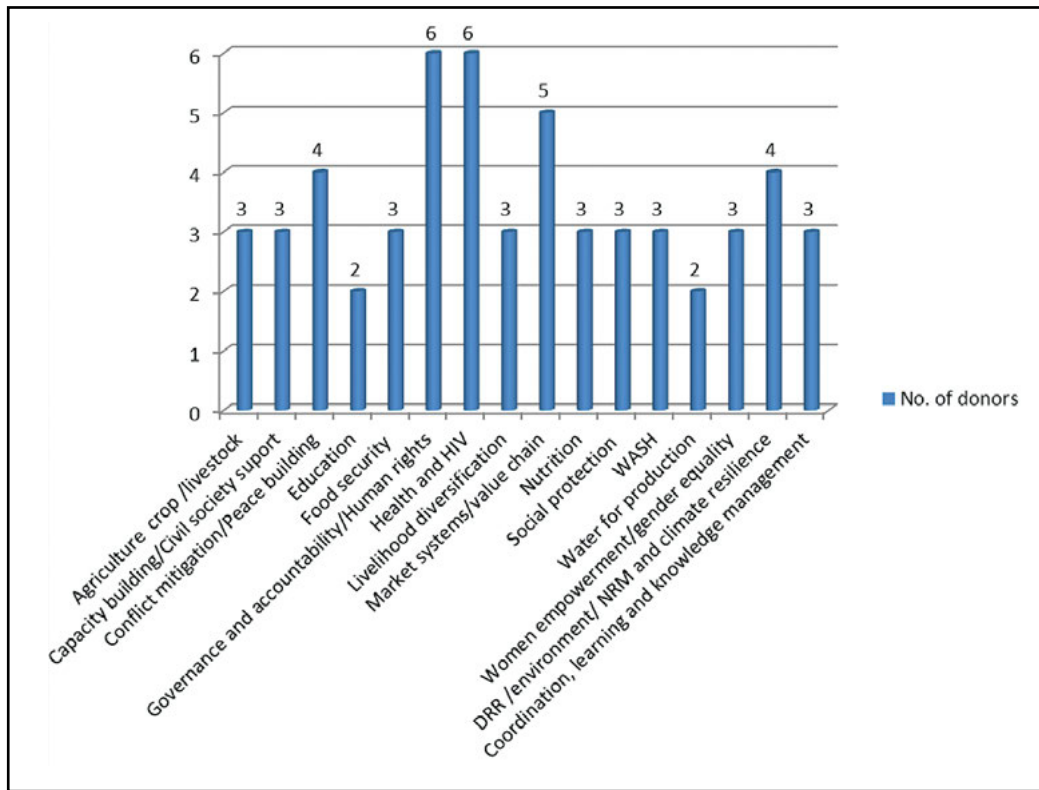
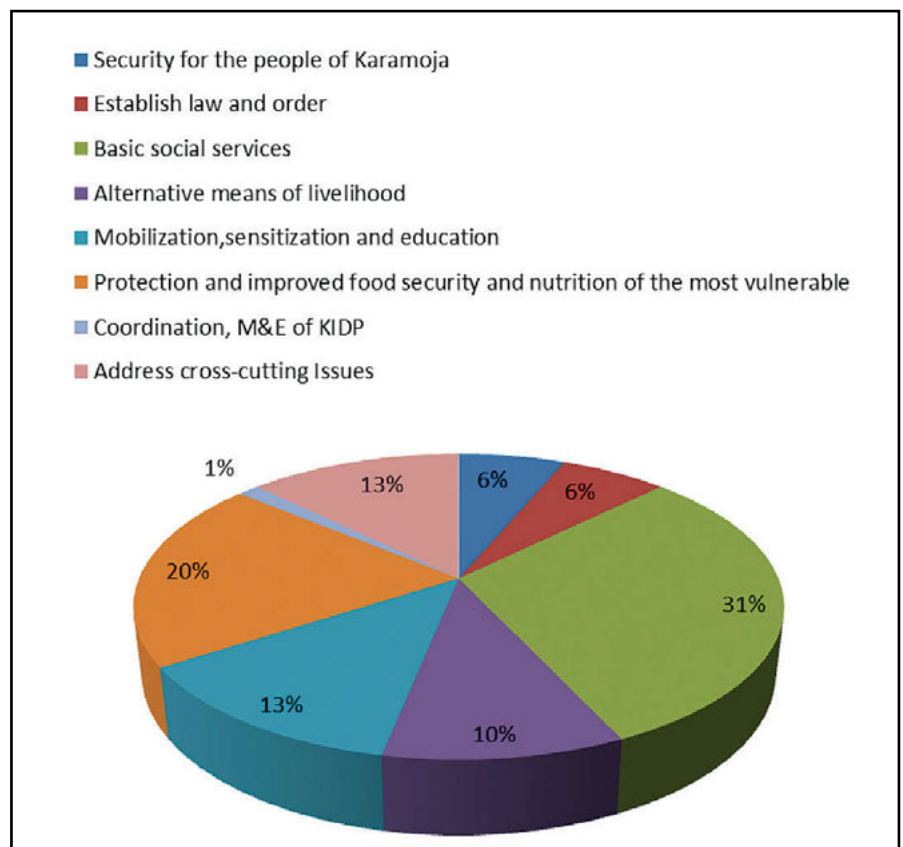


Figure 8. Project alignment to KIDP Strategic Objectives in Karamoja, 2018.

Close to a third of active projects align to Strategic Objective (SO) 3 of the Karamoja Integrated Development Plan (KIDP 2), which focuses on providing basic social services, followed by Objective 6, which focuses on protection and improved food security and nutrition for the most vulnerable. There are a number of projects that align to other strategic objectives as well. See Figure 8 right and Table 6 for details.

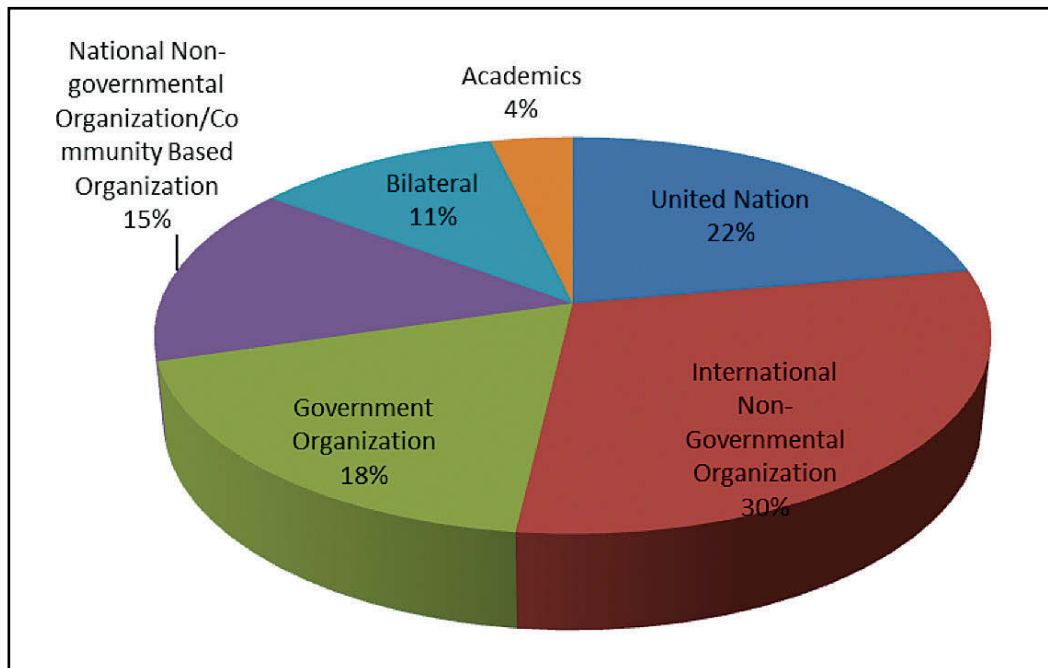
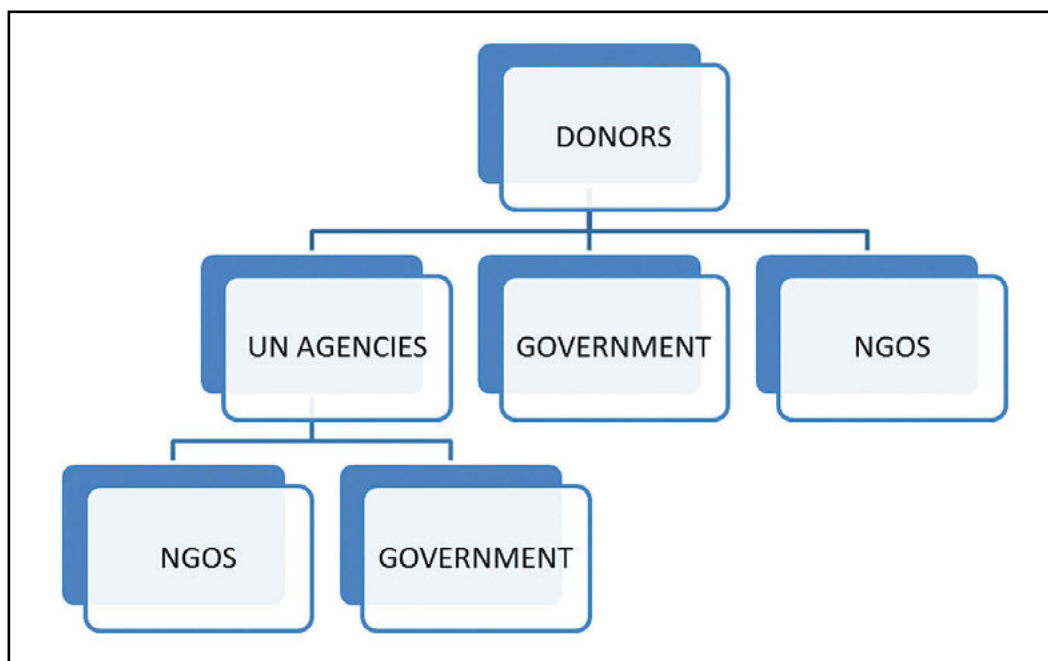


Figure 10. External funds flow to Karamoja sub-region.

The nine bilateral donors support humanitarian and development interventions in Karamoja through 29 implementing partners (IPs). Most of the projects are directly implemented by NGOs, both international and local civil society organizations, representing 45% of the projects. UN agencies have a 22% share. (According to the UN mapping completed by KRSU in June 2017, UN agencies in turn partner with NGOs and local government in their implementation; see Figure 10 below). Direct implementation through government, both local and national, represents up to 18% of the total. About 11% of the projects are also implemented by bilateral organizations such as Belgian Technical Cooperation and GIZ. See Figure 9 below and Table 7.

Figure 9. Donor projects and implementing partners by type in Karamoja, 2018.
